Dear Friends,

Perhaps by the time you read this, the busiest part of the tourist season will be dying down, but there will still be plenty of visitors about. It is a great privilege to live in place which people want to visit for refreshment and relaxation. It is a very important thing we offer here: space for people to escape from some of the routines and pressures of daily life and maintain what we have come to call 'a healthy work-life balance'.

In Luke's Gospel there is a story of Jesus with two sisters, Mary and Martha. Martha is fed up because she is doing all the housework, and Mary is just sitting listening to Jesus and is not helping at all. Eventually Martha just has to say something, so she asks Jesus to do her a favour and tell Mary to give her a hand.

Most readers have probably at some stage or other felt that they are doing more than their fair share of the work, that there is someone close by who is not really pulling their weight, so perhaps we side with Martha in this argument. But, infuriatingly, Jesus doesn't tell Mary to help with the housework; he says that Mary has chosen the better way.

I don't think Jesus wants to dismiss the importance of hard work. The point is that both dutiful busyness and rest are important. Instead of being incompatible opposites, perhaps we can think of Mary and Martha as representing two sides of a single person.

So the story offers a challenge: how do we achieve a balance between activity and stillness, or, for the person of faith, between dutiful busyness and listening attentively to God in prayer, between the Martha part of us and the Mary part.

## **THE BELL TOWER PROJECT FUND**

Hawkshead Parish Church, St. Michael and All Angels, which is a Grade 1 listed building, urgently needs serious/restoration work on its bell tower. A substantial sum of money needs to be raised in advance of the work being able to take place... (£70,000), which is obviously an enormous demand to make on the rural community and congregation. So we are fundraising.

For those unfamiliar with its history, it is a 14/15<sup>th</sup> century building (The Tower is the oldest part) and one of the best late medieval churches in the North West. The church is largely unaltered since 1585 and it is the principal architectural feature of the Esthwaite Valley.

The church attracts a huge number of visitors and, apart from the visitors, it is well used by the community with its summer concert series, regular school services and other ad hoc events. It is incredibly popular as a wedding destination and most like to have the bells rung on their special day. It is especially noted for its belfry and bell ringing activities and the longest uninterrupted peal ever recorded took place in this Tower.

**None of these would be able to take place if the Tower were to fail!  
And the Tower Roof IS failing.**

There is serious water damage, the walls are damp, plaster and paint are coming away inside, and a large monument had to be removed for interim repairs because iron fixings have rusted due to the dampness.

## **HAWKSHEAD MARKET HALL: REPORT FOR THE YEAR 2015-2016**

The AGM of the Market Hall took place on 29<sup>th</sup> June. The Hall continues to be well used by individuals and community groups, though rental revenue from commercial hirers has fallen since one major user took few days in the 2015 season. However, expenditure is also lower with no

significant unexpected items, so income continues to cover running costs.

One highlight of the year was a General Election hustings, organised by Churches Together in Hawkshead, where the presence of all five candidates drew a capacity crowd.

The replacement seating has been completed: red upholstered chairs are now provided in both the Upper and Lower Rooms. The old chairs have been sold. Permanent disabled access to the Lower Room has been put on hold, pending progress on the Hawkshead Improvement Scheme.

Damage to the building by careless commercial drivers is a problem. In 2015, we had to repair the top steps and, yet again, replace the planter which acts as a "buffer" outside the Market Hall Cottage. Would anyone who spots an incident of damage please inform the Chairman or Secretary.

The Trust's legacy holding from the "Allotments for the Labouring Poor Trust" has finally been wound up, and the funds realised added to our general investment portfolio. The "Logging in Grizedale" painting continues to be on loan: it remains an asset which the Trust can realise if needs be. Not having to keep this valuable painting in the Hall saves the Market Hall several thousands of pounds.

Bill Marshall resigned as Treasurer, due to business commitments: thank you to him for his work. Neil Forsyth was co-opted as a Trustee and appointed Treasurer. Ed Johnson also kindly agreed to serve as a Trustee. Thanks to Paul Gregson for his continued stewardship as Caretaker, and to individual Trustees who have helped with cleaning, tidying-up and numerous small maintenance jobs, thus saving considerable sums.

#### **Congratulations**

Hawkshead pharmacist Simon Butterworth has recently been designated a Fellow of The Royal Pharmaceutical Society for distinction in the profession of pharmacy. This honour is achieved through nomination from colleagues and is one of the highest awards the profession can give. Hawkshead residents will know Simon for his work in the village pharmacy, but may not be aware of his other current roles, including Chair for NHS England Cumbria Local Pharmacy Network and as a tutor with the Centre for Pharmacy Postgraduate Education based at the University of Manchester. Previous work includes work across Lancaster hospitals and supporting medicines management in GP practices around South Lakeland. Simon was awarded a Master of Science with Distinction in Public Health in 2014 and is also a Fellow of the Royal Society for Public Health.

#### **SAVE OUR PHARMACY!**

The NHS aims to make £22 billion of savings by 2020/21.

One plan is to cut funding to pharmacies from 2017, which affects the Hawkshead Pharmacy. It is an essential resource and we need to support it to keep it open. It offers a number of services, which include:



Dispensing of prescriptions and repeat medicines.

Please use the Hawkshead pharmacy for all prescriptions.

- Minor ailment advice and when to see the GP.

Pharmacists are highly qualified and we are fortunate here because our pharmacist is a Fellow of the Royal Pharmaceutical Society and trains others. We have access to confidential health advice in a private room where we cannot be overheard and also by phone.

- Medicine reviews. If you take regular medication and want to talk about it, ask for a medicine review. A copy of the review will be sent to your GP.

- New medicine service. If you are prescribed a medicine for asthma, chronic pulmonary obstructive disease, type two diabetes, or high blood pressure, or you need blood thinning medication, you can receive extra support and advice to help you use your medication effectively.

- Flu jab. Some people fall into a high risk category and are eligible for a free flu jab – these is also given at the surgery.

- NHS health checks. If invited for an NHS Health Check, you can have it carried out at the pharmacy.

- Weight management. You can get and receive weight monitoring.

-Travel vaccinations and travel health. For holiday and travel requirements.

- Disposal of medicines. Take unwanted and out of date medicines to be disposed of safely. Let's keep our pharmacy open! Hawkshead Surgery PPG.

### **Short News Update, Garry Ion,** August 2016

Dear Friends,  
Greetings from Kampala. Yes, I am back after spending the last few weeks expectantly in the UK. As you may know, my mother was admitted to hospital critically ill only three and half weeks ago. As I flew from Uganda via Dubai, we were not sure what was wrong, but the doctors now seem to think it was initially food poisoning. After spending two weeks in hospital, she is recovering at home and starting to feel much better. We (and my family back in Penrith) are very grateful for your prayers. With two month home deputation in the spring and the last few weeks unexpected home leave, my in-tray stretches back to March. Last month I also didn't make it to

South Sudan despite managing to obtain a visa which has subsequently expired. Over the last few days, there have been reports of more fighting in the areas I had planned to visit. Ongoing projects in the area include a health centre, primary school, nursery and staff accommodation. Furthermore, I had hoped to have started the construction of a second primary school and student dormitories. ## **Citizens Advice**

### **1. Holiday problems on the rise!**

Flights that don't exist, hotels next to rubbish dumps and cancelled transfers leaving people stranded, are just some of the problems making holidays a misery. Too often people don't get what they have paid for.

To avoid your dream holiday becoming a nightmare:

Choose a provider with an Air Travel Organiser's Licence (ATOL) for security even if the company goes bust.

Take out travel insurance from the day you book.

Check the excess charges on cheap policies and make sure you insure everything you plan to do, e.g. sports.

If the operator significantly alters your holiday before you go, you don't have to accept and can ask for a full refund.

If flights, transfers and accommodation are not as described, complain straight away to a rep, and if still not satisfied, use the tour operator's complaints procedure.

If your flight is cancelled, you are entitled to a replacement flight or a refund. Travel insurance normally pays better compensation than airlines for luggage problems.

## **2. Too good to be true? - be aware of scams.**

If something seems too good to be true, it probably is just that. Citizens Advice estimates that UK consumers lose **£5 billion** every year to scammers - criminals who play on people's dreams, and their trust, to trick them into handing over money. One in every ten people has been a victim. Don't be the next one - be scam aware, get advice and check before you hand over cash.

There is a huge variety of ways you can be conned out of your money, by mail, phone or online. Bogus agencies offering you a dream partner or job, pensions and investment schemes promising you untold riches, fake tickets, claims that you have won a prize ... they all ask you to hand over money in advance. Some scams pretend to be from your bank or computer operator, asking for passwords. What can you do about all this? **Be scam aware**, take your time, check things out. The Citizens Advice website ([www.citizensadvice.org.uk](http://www.citizensadvice.org.uk)) has lots of detailed information on scams.

## **Cake by the Lake with a Swing.**
